JavaScript: If you love it, set it free

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At the FSF and in the GNU Project, we want **all** computer users to be able to do **everything** they need to do on **any** computer, using **only** free software. We have been working toward this goal since it was announced in 1983.



We have endorsed a full laptop system, the Thinkpad X60 as sold by Gluglug, described on http://fsf.org/ryf.

Richard Stallman published this article in 2009, and was also given as a talk at LibrePlanet.

The title is drawn from his previous 2004 article, "Free but Shackled: The Java Trap," in which Stallman said: "Your program, though in itself free, may be restricted by nonfree software that it depends on. Since the problem is most prominent today for Java programs, we call it the Java Trap."



Last year, Mozilla Firefox decided to kind of hide the option to disable JavaScript. Too many users were disabling it, then reporting bugs about the resulting chaos.

We don't want to avoid *all* JavaScript anyway. We want to avoid nonfree JavaScript.



JavaScript programs are generally nonfree

As distributed to the user, JavaScript programs are nearly always nonfree. When distributed under a free license, it seems anecdotally that permissive licenses are the most common choice.



We should never wait for proprietary software owners to abuse us before switching to free software, but in fact such abuses have been demonstrated in the world of JavaScript.

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Basic freedom checklist

- Provide a license notice and possibly a copy of the free license
- Provide the complete and corresponding source code



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The failure to do these things is why most JavaScript is nonfree.



My bandwidth is bigger than your freedom

JavaScript is usually minified in order to save on bandwidth and improve page loading speed, and also does not deliver you a copy of the license with every JavaScript file.



Minified JavaScript is not source code. Source code is the preferred form for modification.



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JavaScript Web Labels are a structured format to consistently conveniently convey both a copy of the license and the corresponding source code at the same time.

A Web Label is machine readable, so we can have automated tools to parse this information, but we really wanted to emphasize something that is human readable.



It starts with a link

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On each page that uses JavaScript, include a link that points to a labels page. Mark this link with the attribute rel="jslicense", so that automated tools can find it. For example, your final link might look like this:

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Introducing GNU LibreJS

GNU LibreJS (https://gnu.org/s/librejs) is an extension for Mozilla-based browsers.



Why didn't you do it some other way

We don't claim this to be the one true method. Other methods that satisfy the criteria could work. Some have proposed using RDF, some have suggested using HTTP headers. LibreJS can be extended to support multiple schemas.



The "Java Trap" was essentially solved through a combination of hard work by free software hackers to create a free version of the Java platform, and Sun's wise decision to relicense the official platform as free.
